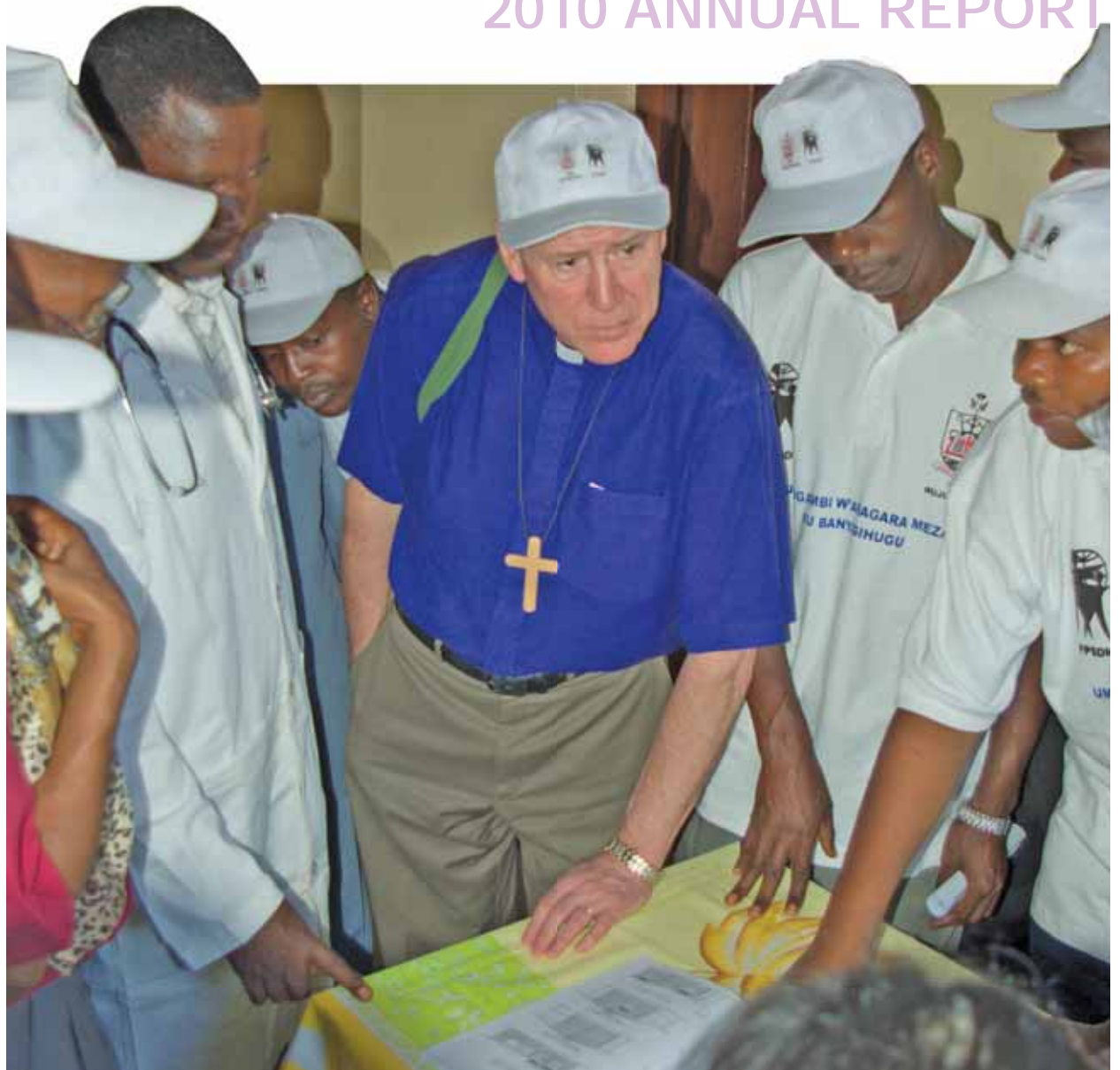

A vision requires a map to know where we are and how to get where we want to be. We need to situate ourselves, to know the lay of

the land, to see how things are shifting and cohering, and discern how to meet changing and uncharted needs. We need to understand how much we can do and how we can do it well. The map inside this issue gives an overview of the places and kinds of programs Canadian Anglicans support through PWRDF: 58 partners in 22 countries.

In 2010, the PWRDF Canadian network of diocesan and parish representatives met in two regional meetings in Calgary, Alberta and London, Ontario. They, along with bishops, priests and parish treasurers encourage Anglicans across Canada to strengthen PWRDF's witness to God's healing love in a world where so many are hurting so deeply. The faithful support of thousands of Canadian Anglicans across the country has allowed PWRDF to consistently fund long-term programs, the demonstrated impact of which are a source of inspiration and hope. Generous response to

disasters such as the 2010 earthquake in Haiti and the 2011 earthquake in Japan allows PWRDF to react immediately to the needs of survivors. While costs continue to rise all over the world, PWRDF continuously seeks creative ways of keeping administrative expenses at an acceptable level.

Our board and staff have worked this past year to put in place renewed governance structures and a 2012–2015 strategic plan. Staff have prepared four proposals for CIDA (the Canadian International Development Agency) approval. The largest is a five-year \$10,799,381 program focusing on health and food security in Burundi, Mozambique and Tanzania destined to reach 1.5 million people in approximately 59 villages. The others build on South African HIV and AIDS work and maternal and child health programs in Bangladesh and Mozambique.

PWRDF partners continue to be inspirational and

transformative agents of our work and hope. Three partners from Cuba, Sri Lanka and Mexico have been honoured by their governments this year for the agricultural and human rights work PWRDF supports them in doing.

Whatever the map shows us, we know we walk together in partnership. Bishop Pie Ntukamazina of the Diocese of Bujumbura in Burundi—a PWRDF partner—said, "Partnership is beyond money. Partnership is beyond physical development. It's about working together to shape a vision. How do we make it work? It grows as a relationship."

Fostering a Culture of Respect for Mexican Women

In the midst of drug trade related violence, thousands of murders a year, and rampant human rights abuses, the Centro de Derechos Humanos de las Mujeres (CEDEHM), the Centre for Women's Human Rights in Ciudad Juárez, Mexico has been working to promote the rights of women, to provide legal advice, to raise awareness, and to advocate for women's rights. CEDEHM offers support for women like Marisela Escobedo, who was murdered across the street from the Governor's Palace in Chihuahua City last December as she protested the "innocent" verdict handed down to her own daughter's admitted killer. CEDEHM was recognized for their work by the Human Rights Commission in Mexico City. The award "means a lot and is greeted with great humility. It is a recognition of the women's movement in the state of Chihuahua and the work done," said Luz Estela Castro Rodriguez. "With this award we are enveloped and strengthened, it is a gesture of support in the midst of the danger in which we live

and is dedicated to all the women who are no longer with us..."

Despite threats, intimidation and violence, the staff of CEDEHM will continue their work, until their cry of "ni una mas" (not one more!) is a reality—until there are no more feminicides (the killing of women) in Chihuahua, Mexico.

Developing Skills, Learning Hope in Burundi

Vulnerable young women in Burundi are receiving new hope through the Mother's Union of the Diocese of Bujumbura. 20 young girls and women aged 16-25—single parents, illiterate or the victims of rape—are part of a skills development program each year. Through the program, they develop employable skills including sewing, embroidery and cooking. The program also provides counseling and accompaniment to the women. The Mother's Union works to create a safe environment for the women to learn these skills and then helps them to reconnect with society.

Graduates from the program have gone on to become teachers, caterers and seamstresses. Thanks to the work of PWRDF and the Diocese of Bujumbura, they are now able to support themselves and their families.

Healthy Mothers and Children in Tanzania

Georgina lives in Chakama, Tanzania, a village supported by PWRDF with funding from the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA). A traditional birth attendant encouraged Georgina to have her baby at the local health clinic built by PWRDF, since there was a possibility of complications during the delivery. After a difficult delivery, both mother and baby are doing well. Georgina and her new son Leslie are examples of how local clinics and well-trained medical health practitioners are helping to lower the maternal and child mortality rate in Tanzania.

An Abundance of Produce

The Movement for Land and Agricultural Reform (MONLAR) in Sri Lanka exists to promote ecological, organic home gardening. MONLAR works with groups of small-scale farmers to teach them about organic farming methods and to help them grow locally available crops in their home gardens. 985 families in 32 villages have benefited from MONLAR's support in the Hambantota District of southern Sri Lanka.

These small farmers have been able to increase their production of fruits, vegetables, spices, and medicinal

plants so that they are able to meet their families' needs for food and have extra left over to sell. MONLAR-trained farmers near the town of Hambantota have come together to open a small shop where they are able to sell their excess food. On any given day, about 15 families' extra food can be purchased at the market, and daily sales range from 2000-8000 rupees (\$20-\$80Cdn).

This extra income from selling their surplus produce is helping to give these farmers a bit of a financial cushion which they can use to pay for children's schooling, to enhance their farms or for social events.

Flood Relief in Pakistan

Throughout the summer of 2010, flood waters slowly covered over 20% of the land area of Pakistan. PWRDF responded to the needs of thousands of people who were displaced by the flooding with over \$475,000. PWRDF's work in Pakistan has focused on three areas: emergency food aid, emergency shelter, and support for health care and livelihoods.

PWRDF's food aid is part of the \$5 million Canadian Foodgrains Bank program, which has fed over 266,000 people with 9,500 tonnes of food including wheat, flour, rice, lentils, oil, sugar and salt. PWRDF's emergency shelter program has distributed tents to 510 families in the Sindh region, and has been supported by the Manitoba Council for International Cooperation.

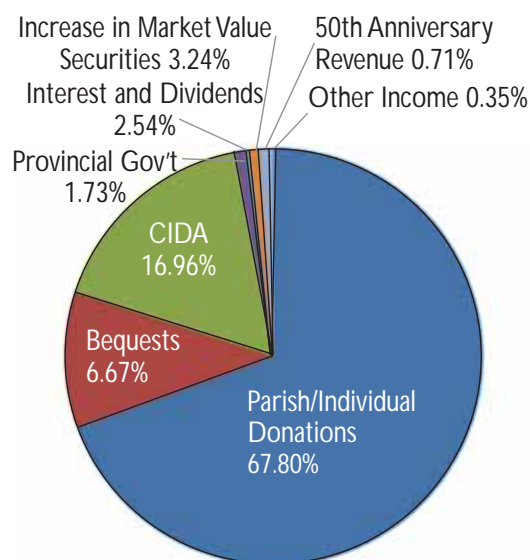
The bulk of PWRDF's support has gone through the ACT Alliance. The ACT projects in Pakistan are aimed at helping those who have lost their agricultural land and livelihoods to begin to recover, and providing health care. The livelihood project is training over 225 men in the Khairpur District to work in the construction field. The floods have destroyed railways, roadways, homes, and other infrastructure. Trained tradespeople will be invaluable in the reconstruction and will also be able to support their families. The threat of waterborne diseases led ACT to support a health unit in Muzaffargarh District. This health unit provides services to approximately 20,000 people, including mothers and young children.

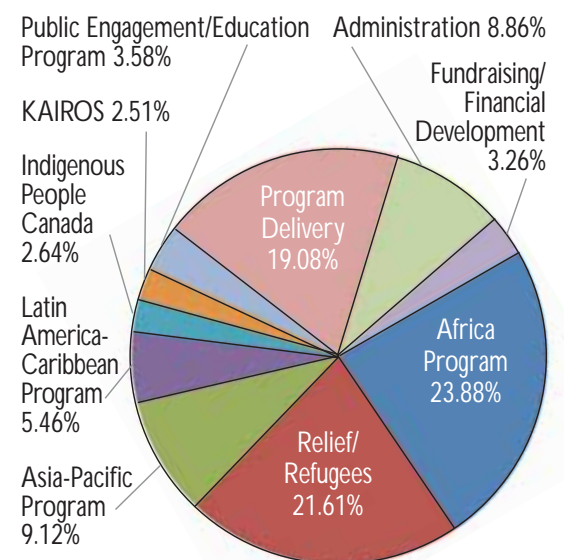
