

Refugee Sponsorship in 2025: The Current Landscape

welcomed by Canada through government resettlement and private sponsorship in 2023

27,660

of these were through the **Private Sponsorship of Refugees (PSR)** program.

Towards the end of 2024, Immigration, Refugees, and Citizenship Canada (IRCC) announced three changes:

17% reduction

in landing (arrival) targets for the PSR program in 2025

1 year pause

on new Group of Five (G5) and Community Sponsorship (CS) applications

20% reduction

in spots available for Sponsorship Agreement Holders (SAHs) for 2025 applications

While this is aimed at reducing processing times for existing applicants (currently 3+ years), it means fewer refugees will access the program.

It also means that now the only way to sponsor a refugee is through a Sponsorship Agreement Holder.

Locally, refugee newcomers and their sponsors are finding it harder than ever to land jobs and find housing, amidst high unemployment rates, increased demand for housing in general, and high costs of living.

In this context, the work of SAHs and sponsor groups has increased. It is also **more important than ever** to help refugees find safety in Canada.

In light of IRCC's divestment in the sponsorship program and more complex post-arrival challenges, individuals and faith communities have an important role to play.
